ABANDONED STORE SEEKS REZONING

The long neglected property where the *Kwick Stop* was located, next to the church at 4th Place and Yale, is seeking to be rezoned from a light commercial designation to a full commercial property. The Turner Park and White City Neighborhoods, as well as our churches are opposed. Indications are the owner would like to sell the property to become a CBD/Medical Marijuana store. At this point, the Tulsa City Council is set to vote on this on November 17. Your help in contacting your city councilor to **vote No** on this rezoning would be appreciated. In the meanwhile, the church voted Sunday morning to authorize discussions with the owners to negotiate a possible donation compensation agreement with the church for the property.
